Fruilmodel Armor Link Track Assembly Tips

Here are some advantages of Friulmodel cast metal tracks:

- 1. Reasonably easy to assemble
- 2. Flexible and hang realistically
- 3. Sets produced for a wide set of AFVs
- Worth every cent versus other individual link systems

"I BUILD SHORT LENGTHS BY PLACING TOGETHER, ONE AFTER THE OTHER, FIVE TO TEN TRACK LINKS AND INSERT THE PINS, LINK TO LINK, ON EACH TRACK. "

 Small imperfections or flash should be trimmed off the tracks. This is rare, but occasionally it happens. For your cleaning process, use a sharp

ready made for the track pins to be inserted. However, the holes need to be cleaned by boring them with a drill bit. This will permit the pins to slide inside more easily. set. Rods of 0.019" or 0.020" will do the trick.

- I trim the brass rods into track length sizes. Allow a little excess.
- I build short lengths by placing together, one after the other, five to ten track links and insert the pins, link to link, on each track. The idea is to connect all the short lengths until you have the total length you need per side, e.g. 82, 96, or 100 links per side.
- Secure the pins (outer ends only) with a small drop of CA glue. I prefer the medium type. Accelerator can be used to speed up the drying time of the glue. Otherwise, just let them air dry.
- Trim the excess brass rods with a side cutter. Wearing safety glasses

- For the pins, I use brass rods instead of the soft wire provided with the

is recommended.

Brief comments about painting and weathering:

- Generally speaking, the total amount of links indicated above are what you need per side for most of the popular AFVs. Cleaning, boring the holes, placement, positioning of the links and trimming the excess takes an average of 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 hours.
- Smooth the pins ends of the tracks either by simply sanding or with a flat needle file. The idea is to simulate the solid metal of the real spuds.
- A quick sanding is advisable prior to painting and weathering.

- They are determined by the model you are building. e.g. Is it a Tiger I which saw action at the Russian Front? Or is it a Tunisian Tiger? Bear in mind the terrain condition changes.
- The track can be dipped (2-3 minutes) in Blacken-It[®] or vinegar. Or sand it for better adhesion and then spray it on both sides and edges with earthy or rusty colors.

Consider the options and decide which of them to use.

Introduction

The Raupenschlepper Ost (RSO) started as a transport tractor for the Eastern front (Ost is German for "east"). Its fully tracked drivetrain was designed for operating in Russia's quagmire terrains, and this reliable vehicle was well liked by the troops. In 1943, Steyr Werke, maker of RSO, initiated the RSO/02program to mount a 75mm PaK40 on its flat bed as an anti-tank weapon. Hitler was most impressed by the demonstration of the prototype, and an immediate production plan was formulated. Eventually, only 60 RSOs were converted, and most of them were deployed with Army Group South in Russia during its service trial.

Background

The base for this $1/35^{\text{th}}$ scale

diorama actually started twenty years ago when I was stationed in Germany. I was toying with the idea of building an anti-aircraft diorama with Tamiya's *Flakpanzer IV Mobelwagen*. I needed something for a base, and I liked the shape of my ex-wife's old cutting board. So I "liberated" it from the kitchen while she was at work one day. In the end, I was not happy with how the scene turned out (nor was she happy with what I did to her cutting board). Later after we separated, the *Mobelwagen* and the base suffered the same fate, and their marriage also ended in dissolution.

A year ago while looking for something in my garage, I found the old cutting board again among my pile of junk. I decided to give it one more go as a diorama base for old time's sake (no chance for my ex-wife though).

Thus, a second front for the base was declared.

The Models

The RSO/02 is an Italeri kit I built more or less out of the

box. The only upgrades I made were adding Friulmodel tracks, replacing the engine screen with the fine deck screen from Tamiya's T72 kit, and installing a new PaK40. The 75mm gun provided in the kit is the old model from the 70s. It is not up to par with our "modern" standard, so I chose DML/Dragon's latest offering with the bonus metal barrel.

Everything went together nice and neat with no surprise at all. I sprayed the RSO with Tamiya paints, and the camouflage was done freehanded. To give the model more depth, I applied a burnt umber wash followed by drybrushing various colors for highlights.

The five figures were taken from the same PaK40 kit (#6250 "PaK40 Late Type w/ Fallschirmjäger, Anzio 1944"). They were also box stock built with minor modifi-

cations to their poses to fit better with AFV Club's brass shells. I painted them using Vallejo acrylics with help from my buddy Shawn Merrell and the methods prescribed in Osprey's Modelling Fallschirmjäger Figures.

Beware most acrylics need something to "bite" into, and priming is absolutely necessary when using Vallejo paints. Tamiya Primer is a good choice, but Krylon Gray Primer gives you more bang for your buck: a 12oz spray can only costs about \$5, and

it lasts twice as long as Tamiya's 180ml rattler!

<u>The Base</u>

Prior to applying Plaster of Paris for the groundwork, Faller's HO paper sidewalls were glued in place for the street. I used the old Italeri's ruin street corner with plaster poured into the plastic walls to form the interior surfaces.

The second floor was scratchbuilt with balsa wood, and I made the sandbags with A+B Epoxy. The bricks were Custom Dioramics items, and the rubbles were made from cat litter (fresh, not soiled!) courtesy of Ted and Nessie, my two feline coinhabitants.

After all the elements were glued in place, I painted the ground dirt color and then highlighted with different shades of green and gray. The bricks were painted Tamiya Red Brown and fadewashed with Tamiya Buff to give it an old and dusty look.

Conclusion

After 20 years of neglect, I finally managed to put the old base to good use. I'm happy with how this diorama turned out. Somehow I don't think my ex-wife will ever appreciate what I have done to her old chopping board!
