


German troops with a captured British tank during the

Picking up from where I left off last year, it's time to put some colors on my Centaur.

Painting

By June 1944, most, if not all, Commonwealth AFVs were painted in S.C.C.15 Olive Drab. However, this general order was only applicable to Army units. Vehicles in the Royal Marine Armoured Support Group (RMASG) belonged to the British Navy, so the Admiralty got to decide what was best for their Centaurs. The color chosen was S.C.C.2 Khaki Brown, a "rich dark brown with a hint of Khaki," according to wartime British color historian Mike Starmer. Tamiya recommends Flat Earth XF-52 in the instruction sheet for its 1/35th kit. I prefer Starmer's interpretation (Humbrol Chocolate 98 + Dark Earth 29 in ratio 5:4) instead.

After prepping my model with Tamiya gray primer, I sprayed a coat of S.C.C.2 using the mix ratio mentioned above. Then I applied a lighter version on all horizontal surfaces to create zentithal light effect. It took several tries to get the shade right by cutting the Chocolate (98) ratio in the mix. In the end the ratio of brown to khaki was almost 1:4, as I recall.



The tracks were painted with Tamiya Dark Iron (XF-84). This has been my go-to color for tank tracks ever since Humbrol discontinued Track Colour (173), my old favorite. The new Tamiya color is actually a better match for new or semi-new tracks as it has only a slight hint of brown in its mix.

The waterproof covers for the 95mm gun and the periscopes were painted Dark Green, and the big

tarp on the engine deck was left naked in its resin color (to be painted with Khaki down the road).

Two light coats of Future were then applied, and I was ready to do some serious decaling.

Decaling

The decals came from Peddinghaus, a German aftermarket decal company. I used EP2713 Royal Marine Sherman-Cromwell-Centaur Support Tanks. Beware you have to cut out each item as the decals were printed by an ALPS printer on one continuous sheet with no individual carrier film backing.

I cut the white 360° fire-control markings into sections to make them go on the turret easier. Lots of patience and decal setting solution were needed.



The battery number (2) with its multi color background was a bit too light to my eyes. In hindsight, I should have laid down a piece of white decal of the same size first to make the colors stand out better. Oh well.

The rest of the decals went on with no trouble. I added a white star to the back of the wading stack. Loading up some Dark Earth (29) in my airbrush, I applied a "misty spray" to create a faded look for the Allied Star.



More Painting...

Before commencing weathering, I decided to go back and do some more painting. The big tarp on the engine deck was painted Khaki with shadows and highlights added. Next I repeated the same process with all the waterproof covers. Painting softskin parts on a tank model is no different from painting the uniform on a figure. Not only It compliments the tank's paint job, it makes the model stand out from the crowd.



In closing, I want to thank you all for being members of AMPS. Please think hard of about the items above and I hope to meet a large number of you in Danbury in April.





IBG intends to release all variants of the IJA Type 89 medium tank in 1/72nd scale. First up is the early gasoline version.




Trumpeter likes big rockets lately. Check out its new 1/35th Luna-M (FROG-7) and TEL combo.
