

antennas and replacement brass smoke grenade tubes (I think they were from Modelpoint).

Assembly of the model was very straight forward. There was no issue at all. The kit has a nice little feature of adjusting the track tension via a long paddle on the inside, near the rear of the hull.

About half-way through construction, you fit your tracks, adjust the tension via the paddle, and freeze the location with the glue of your choice. After I did that, I completed the construction phase and prepped for paint.



Since I was building the kit as a late model Luchs, I was stuck with an Eastern Front camo scene of Dark Yellow with green wavy stripes, typical of vehicles in the 4th Panzer Division. I had to factor in some Russian involvement since that's my thing. To do that I reckoned I had some Russian Infantry somewhere, so off to my unbuild figure storage where I found some resin figures by Stalingrad that I had purchased a while back.





I am a big fan of Stalingrad figures and had picked up a number of "Dead" Germans and some Russian infantry in action poses. Once I had my figures picked, I quickly decided on a small scene. The idea is a Russian Infantry squad moving through some retreating German Infantry, using the Luchs for cover while calling in some covering fire from a nearby Stalin organ unit.





The base is a simple wood plaque purchased from Hobby Lobby and painted black. I built up a raised road section with an additional piece of wood laying around my model room. Ground cover is a mix of Durham's wood putty and Celluclay. I added a little Vallejo paint to tone it as ground/dirt.



Once dried, I laid on two to three layers of static grass followed by a soaking with AK gravel and sand fixer. I also added a few taller weed type plants to vary the appearance some.



For the road surface, I laid a thin layer of Vallejo black lava earth texture. I love this stuff. It looks like cement or blacktop pavement, depending on how you color it once it is dried.

Since my Luchs model has articulating suspension, it can be very easily adapted to the terrain slope on the side of the road. This is where Friul tracks help the most.

Once I had secured the tank to the base, I moved on to the figures. Like all resin figures, I removed the pour plugs and assembled with superglue. After I addressed any gaps, I primed them with Tamiya Primer. Vallejo and Tamiya paints were used to complete the figures and all the battlefield debris that came with the German figures.

All in all, a very enjoyable project.





RiverCon VII Recap

Back in March this year, my wife Susan and I went to the RiverCon VII show. We had never been to this show before, although I had planned on going last year and the year before. Weather and other events forced our plans to change.

We spent Friday night before the show in Bossier City, Louisiana. On Saturday morning we made a short trip from the motel to the Bossier City Conference Center.

According to Andy Bloom, the President of IPMS Red

River Modelers, this year's RiverCon had 77 contestants and 477 entries. He was pleased to note that contestants came from Oklahoma, Arkansas, Texas, and Louisiana.



Again according to Andy, there was a 70% increase in contestants from last year's show, and a 50% increase in model entries. Like most shows of this size, some categories were stacked. The good thing was the host club did not hesitate to split categories. Some categories were split that probably would not have been divided at other shows. Softskin Armor was an example. That was the first time I saw that category split.





Challenge coins were given for first, second, and

third place finishes. Some folks may prefer a more substantial award, but I think the coins are neat. In addition, if one has a wall full of stuff, the coins look great along side the award-winning model since they take up very little space.





The special awards were excellent. I was blessed to receive one

(Best Miscellaneous) for my "Sherman Family Tanks" collection.

The Bossier City Convention Center made a good venue. Several fast food restaurants are within a short distance. A KFC is located practically across the street. In addition, hot dogs, hamburgers, and such were available in the lobby.



Raffle prizes were available at \$1 and \$5 levels. The selection of prizes was good. Unfortunately, someone else got "my" \$5 prize! Maybe we will have better luck next year.

Vendors offered a wide variety of model kits, paints, and tools. One interesting issue for vendors was the taxman. Near the end of the show, all vendors met with a sales tax official and paid their taxes on items sold. That was the first time I have seen such, but the vendors seemed to take it all in stride.

In my opinion, the show was a well-organized event. The registration went smoothly, and the members of IPMS Red River Modelers were friendly and helpful. I would gladly return to future RiverCon shows and recommend it.


