### A Sino-morphed Ha-Go

ype 95 "Ha-Go" light tank was the most numerous armored fighting vehicle used by the Imperial Japanese Army (IJA) during WWII. Despite being thinly armored (12mm thick) and lightly armed (one 37mm anti-tank gun and two 7.7mm machine guns), it was good enough to take on light infantry units. However, it

was utterly useless against any medium tank fielded by the US or Commonwealth. In fact, it couldn't even run away fast enough; its top speed was about 18 mph (not that any self-respecting Japanese soldier would ever attempt to do in the heat of a battle!).


In case you wonder, I did not seek out this 1/35<sup>th</sup> FineMolds kit on my initiative. It came to me as a White

#### From the Turret


reetings! Please remember the Sherman tanks are due this month. Our veep lan plans on having a club display at the San Antonio show even though the group build category is no longer available as a competition item.

Elephant (WE) gift exchange some years ago. Since I was absent from our Christmas party last year, I can build any one of my WE kits. So this is my effort of trying to avoid my \$10 "voluntary donation" and reduce my "to-finish" pile.

#### Construction

It's hard to believe the FineMolds kit is over 27 years old. It was considered a state-of-the-art production when it debuted in 1992, and for the longest time it was the only game in town until DML's versions (early and late) came along in 2013. What even more amazing is FineMolds is STILL cranking out this quarter-century-old kit as late as last year!

Unfortunately, longevity is not necessarily a good thing in plastic modeling. The mold of this FineMolds kit is no longer fine after all these years, and the parts really show their age. Clearing up took longer than usual for a Japanese produced kit. Part fit ranged from average to poor. I had to deploy putty in several areas to fill in gaps.





For those modelers who cannot build without aftermarket details, Eduard made a PE set (35032) that has been discontinued but is still widely available. Since my aim was to avoid the \$10 penalty, I wisely skipped the expense of the PE set. However, by chance at a local show I picked up a brass barrel made by FineMolds for this kit in a bargain bin. It only cost me a couple of bucks, so it didn't hurt my wallet that bad.

The kit's rubber band tracks are cruel and not acceptable by today's standard. At first I could only think of two remedies: white metal (Friul) or plastic (Modelkasten) track set. I told myself "self, either one of them is gonna burn a \$40+ hole in your wallet!"

But then the next best solution presented itself while I was searching for Friul tracks on eBay: a seller decided to unload the DS tracks of his DML Type 95 kit at a bargain price of \$9.99! Woohoo! A few clicks and days later, I received the tracks in the mail. They fit perfectly on my FineMolds kit. Sorted!



#### **Painting**

Since I wanted to get this kit done pronto, I was in no mood to do any of the elaborate multi-color camouflage schemes Japanese tanks were famous for during WWII. One day while flipping through our friend Russ Holm's book on Japanese tanks, I spotted the color profile of a postwar Type 95 used by Communist China's People's Liberation Army (PLA). Apparently many Japanese equipment

captured by the Soviets in Manchuria were given to the PLA to fight against Nationalist forces in the Chinese Civil War (1947-49). The single color paint job seemed easy enough, and the white band around the bottom of the turret (no idea what it signified) should not post any challenge to my average modeling skill, so I settled on "sinomorphing" my Japanese tank.

I started by spraying my model with Tamiya primer. But instead of the usual Gray, I used White. The reason was simple: once I masked and sprayed the rest of the tank green, I had an instant white band around the turret! I'm all for easy when it comes to painting my models.

The base color that I chose for my model was Gunze Mr. Color Russian Green 2 (136), a pretty close interpretation of late war 4BO, in my opinion. To create some color modulation, I mixed in some Dark Yellow (39) to the base color for highlights.

I once read inside the real tank the interior walls were covered with asbestos (yes, the cancer causing stuff!) and painted either light gray or dull silver. Being lazy and in a hurry, I handbrushed the interior with Testors Silver.

The tracks were painted with Tamiya's new Dark Iron (XF-84), a brownish metallic color perfect for any steel-based tank tread. I love this color so much that I'm stocking up the enamel version now!

A coat of Future sealed everything in place, and I was ready for decaling.

#### **Decals**

The markings on my tank all came from various sources. The PLA emblems on the turret were taken from an old Tiger Wing decal sheet with the bars of the PLA Air Force insignia removed. I got the white numbers on the hull from Italeri's M24 Chaffee kit.

#### Weathering

Next I applied filters using SIN products Brown for Dark Green (P245) and Gray for Bright Green (P246). Pin wash came next. Call me old-fashioned, I still prefer artist oils for washes, although I'm now slowly getting the hang of Tamiya's Panel Line Accent Colors. Maybe there's hope for me yet.

Once the wash was completely dried, it was time to make my model dirty. Utilizing different sets of mud paints, I was able to create various kinds of mud (darker color for the wet soil and lighter one for





dried/arid earth) on my model. I highly recommend that everyone give these paints a try. Pay no attention to what brand to get, and just buy what you can afford. One manufacturer's product is just as good as the others.



After Τ dullcoated everything, I "rusted" the muffler with artist oils and pastel chalks using method described Joaquín García Gazquez's book Oil Paint Techniques for Military Vehicles (Abteilung 502). I was very happy with the result. Unfortunately, one

hardly see any of my handiwork after I installed the PE muffler grill included in the kit!

#### And the Oscar Goes To...

Well, not only did I avoid the penalty, I won our white elephant contest with my "sino-morphed" Type 95. Modeling is also just like a box of chocolate, Forest. You never know what you're gonna get!




# New On The Block

RPG, yet another new model company from China, has risen! Their kickoff product is a very well done T-80U in  $1/35^{th}$  scale.


