n part I (March 2018) of my article on Takom's 1/16th Type 94 tankettes, I built and explained the options and the quality of the two kits (early and late types). That was only


Austin Armor Builders Society (AABS) meets at 7PM each month at the **Austin Public Library**. Our next meeting is on

From the Turret

Greetings! Last month we had our first quarterly contest of 2019. The competition was tough, but **Eric Choy** came out on top. Congratulations to all the winners!

We are now well, officially, into spring, and there are a few shows coming up. As mentioned before, they are good preparation for our 2019 AMPS Centex Armor Expo. Remember the theme for this one is "Artillery – King of the Battlefield."

Since this is the April edition of the club's newsletter, I did the research on what was going on in April,

1944 — seventy-five years ago. The fighting in Italy, Anzio and Casino, was still in stalemate. The Allies were not trying to breakthrough with any major action. Nor were the Axis powers making a coordinated effort to wipeout the Anzio beachhead. Both sides were on the verge of exhaustion. This is not to say there were no probing actions, but most of the fighting was being done by artillery and mortar barrages. In other words, casualties on both sides were still being inflicted.

On the Eastern Front, the Russians were on the offensive. The results were mixed with some successes for the Red Army and some victories of sort for the Germans.

What did catch my interest, however, was the end of the Cape Gloucester campaign. April 1944 marked the end of the U.S. 1st Marine Division victory over Japanese forces on the Island of New Britain and the capture of two important airfields. This was the second major action by the 1st Marine Division up to this point in the war. The first of course was the capture and holding of Guadalcanal.

These actions are depicted in the Pacific television series, akin to Band of Brothers. In my opinion, the Pacific is a very informative and interesting series. If you have not seen it, I would highly recommend it.



Holding on against Japanese counter-attacks.

By the time the campaign ended, over three hundred American marines had paid the ultimate price with well over another one thousand men wounded. It is believed more than two thousand Japanese soldiers died for their country. Although the terrain was not suitable for large scale armor movement, the marines were able to use tanks to overcome some of the Japanese strong points.

As was typical in any war, the victors often collected trophies in the aftermath of battle. The image below depicts marines of the 1st Marine Division near the end of the Cape Gloucester fighting. These battlehardened men captured Japanese flags now in their possession.



I hope members find this article at least somewhat of interest. I do believe armor used in the Pacific is often under depicted in modeling circuits even though there are quite a few interesting examples/kits available.

complete, I wanted to differentiate them and opted for the solid green version that was offered for the late version and used the multi-color for the early.

For base colors I used Vallejo 1937-45 IJA Early/ Late Acrylic Airbrush Color Set. Some were adjusted as outlined later. The Earth Green was applied to both the single and multi-color versions as it seemed to match the base color of most artwork I've seen of Japanese tanks. On both tanks I darkened the Earth Green with dark brown and black and airbrushed onto edges and seams and lower sections of the tanks for shadowing effects. Then I highlighted by adding yellow and white to the Earth Green for panel fading and on highlights.

On the multi-color camo, I sprayed the camo sections consecutively with the Vallejo Earth Brown, Camo

Pale Brown and IJA Midouri Green. Each was shadowed and highlighted like the Earth Green previously. However, the Camo Pale Brown was exaggerated because it didn't show enough contrast. Edges were sharpened with a brush to show the hard edged camo that was applied at the time.

On the early camo schemes, the Japanese painted disruptive lines of yellow in a ragged cross over all the other camouflage. I've often seen it look too bright, so I cut the IJA Chrome Yellow with some Tamiya Dark Yellow before applying via airbrush and sharpening via brush. That color was also highlighted and shadowed to show the play of light on the tankette.

It was then time to paint the "black" tires with a dark brownish gray and the exhausts in multiple rusty browns and oranges on both vehicles.





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Decals were added over two dried coats of Future floor wax. They were sealed with another coat of Future. Washes of various browns and tans were added over both vehicles to tone down the brightness and blend the tones.

The "fun" part began when I took brownish black and pinwashed (outlined) every nut and bolt, seam and crevasse on the tankettes. That was followed by light tan highlights on top of the same. The highlights were also added to the edges of EVERY plate to enhance the shapes.

Finally, Tamiya Dark Earth was dusted on the lower surfaces followed by lighter dusting of Tamiya Buff.

The kit-supplied figure was added to show the scale. After putting the model on a simple base, I considered this early Type95 tankette done. On to the late type... (to be continued)



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

AFV Club has also released its US Army M728 combat engineer vehicle in 1/35th scale.




Following MiniArt's latest BMRs is the "TOP" armored recovery vehicle in 1/35th. Any idea why this vehicle was called "TOP?"
