

When you open the box, you are greeted to a very nice instruction booklet complete with a thorough


Austin Armor Builders Society (AABS) meets at 7PM each month at the **Austin Public Library Old Quarry Branch.** Our next meeting is on

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background, photos of the car, and period technical drawings. The kit comes with an interior and engine compartment. While the engine is very nice, the

interior is lacking when compared to the drawings from the instructions booklet. The booklet also shows plenty of ammo cans inside the car, yet none are provided in the kit. So, the model has just a very basic interior.



Overall parts fit was good but with some issues. All flat surfaces have shallow pushpin marks that needed to be filled, including all of the hatches. If you intend to show off any of the interior, those hatches will need some attention as in putty and with the addition of latches/handles. I added these items to most of the hatches from my spare parts box.






The undercarriage has protective parts covering the engine and transmission. Be careful with alignment as I had a gap that I had to fill with strip styrene. Not sure if it was my fault or a kit design issue.

Some other notes from construction:

- The engine, engine bay, and interior areas are best painted before assembly.
- Main MG is in two pieces, split down the center without ammo or ammo can, which is puzzling.
- The engine exhaust should be drilled out before attaching.





You are provided with two painting/marking options. One has those big Iron Crosses and the other without. Those big markings were painted out after seeing some combat with only the name "ROMFELL" remained. Since I wanted those Iron Crosses, I had to plan out my painting approach.

First, I painted the main body green after masking off the interior. Then I masked off the green and painted the side areas black. Next was to mask off the white background squares for the black Iron Crosses. Once the white was completed, I removed all masking.

The black Iron Cross decals are a tad fragile, so be careful when handling and applying them onto the model. I had to use a little decal solvent to help them conform to the surface details of the model. Once the solvent dried, I had two areas to touch up with black paint. I then sealed the entire model with Clear Flat from Tamiya before starting the weathering.

After weathering, I decided to place the kit on a small base depicting a farmhouse. The lone figure is from Stalingrad.

Overall, I am pleased with this project.

Copper State Models is supposed to do another armored car of WWI. I'm not sure which one, but I hope they eventually get around to doing those big Russian armored cars of WWI.

Go build a Toon-Tank now. That's all, forks!

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
