

The Atlanta Figure Show used to be much bigger in size and attendance, but


Austin Armor Builders Society (AABS) meets at 7PM each month at the **Austin Public Library Old Quarry Branch.** Our next meeting is on

At any rate, I recently built a T-34 from the old but reliable Tamiya kit. I was pleasantly surprised when

As we look back seventy-five years ago, WWII was nearing its end, especially in Europe. On the 4<sup>th</sup> of March, Finland turns against Germany by declaring war on her former ally.

On the 7<sup>th</sup> of March, the Ludendorff Bridge at the town of Remagen was captured by the US 9<sup>th</sup> Armored Division. Thousands of troops breached the natural defensive barrier of the Rhine River using this bridge before it eventually collapsed from severe structural damage. 


envelop the German industrial area of the Ruhr more quickly than planned and shortened the war in Europe. At the same time, Cologne fell to American troops mainly by the US 3<sup>rd</sup> Armored Division.

With these two events in mind, I would like to recommend two different books. The first is The Bridge at Remagen by Ken Hechler. A movie by the same name was made in 1969. It starred Ben Gazzara, Robert Vaughn, and George Segal. And was not too bad in my opinion, although it had a few unlikely fictional drama inserted by Hollywood!

The other book that illustrates events of this time frame is Spearhead by Adam Makos. This book tells the story of an M26 Pershing tank crew of the US 3<sup>rd</sup> Armored Division in the ETO and the fighting in Cologne, Germany. It also tells in part the battle from the German perspective.

In both battles, Remagen and Cologne, the Pershing finally gave American troops a tank that could readily take on the German Tigers and Panthers. Yet even at this stage of the war, the Sherman was still the main workhorse of the Allied armored units. Too few of the Pershing tanks were available, and their need would be short-lived as the war against Germany winded down. Also, German armor was getting very scarce late in the war.

In the fighting against Japan, Manila was completely liberated on the 3<sup>rd</sup> of March, and the Battle of Iwo Jima ended on the 16<sup>th</sup> of March. In this battle, the Marines suffer more casualties than the Japanese.

So that is a wrap on the history. Keep building and painting! Thanks to all members of AABS for making this organization one of the very best!

# "Loony Toon-Tanks!" **June Quarterly Contest**


ive l'amour! Love may be what Pepé Le Pew is into, but for us modelers, it's definitely the "amour" part that gets our attention!

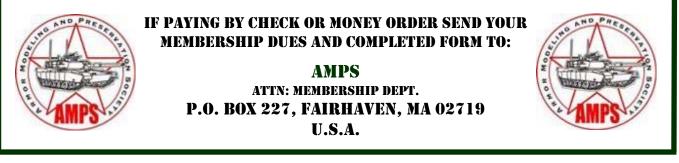


