
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Austin Armor Builders Society (AABS) meets at 7PM each month at the **Austin Public Library Old Quarry Branch**. Our next meeting is on

I have now completed two tanks that could be part of our club build. One is an NVA/PAVN T-54, and the other is an Egyptian T-55 with markings from the 1973 Yom Kippur War. I hope we have several others built or being assembled.

As I left off last month on the history of World War II, seventy-five years ago, the Battle for Berlin was coming to an end. German resistance to the Red Army ended on the 2^{nd} of May.

Go build a Toon-Tank now. That's all, forks!




T-54/55 Group Build

ere's a trivial question for you all tank enthusiasts: what's the most produced tank of all time? No, it's not Sherman or T-34, and yes, the honor goes to the Soviet T-54/55! With so many paint schemes and upgrades open for modelers, it is a logical choice as the subject of a group project.

Here are the criteria of this T-54/55 group build:

- 1/35th scale only
- Must have gun (or guns) of caliber 57mm or larger (i.e. ZSU-57-2 and SU-122/54 are okay but NO armored recovery, APC, bridging, or firefighting variant, please).
- No operator restriction (Angola, China, Cuba, Czechoslovakia, DDR, Egypt, Finland, Iraq, Israel, North Korea, Poland, USSR/Russia, Vietnam, former Yugoslavia states, etc. are all welcomed).
- 4BO is optional! (i.e. feel free to paint your tank any color other than standard Russian Green as long as your color scheme is historically accurate)
- Please close all hatches and DO NOT glue your model to a base!

We are aiming for a group entry in this year's ASMS Capital Classic show in October 2020. So the rendezvous point for our T-54/55s is the **September club meeting**. That leaves us less than six months to build, paint, and weather our models. If you haven't started yet, you need to get a move on NOW. *Ura!*







From the AMPS E-Board

AMPS 2020: As everyone knows the Coronavirus (COVID-19) is upon us worldwide. The E-Board recently met to discuss how this virus is impacting our upcoming AMPS 2020 International Convention, slated for 7 to 9 May 2020 in Camp Hill, PA. Pennsylvania's Governor, along with many other federal and state leaders and leaders of other nations, have taken precautionary measures of cancelling events and gatherings over certain numbers to minimize the growth and spreading of this potentially fatal virus. As such, we can no longer hold our annual International Convention in May 2020.

However, rather than cancel the show for this year, the E-Board decided to postpone this year's International Convention and move it to Danbury, CT on 24-26 September 2020.

This decision was made in consultation with the leadership members of AMPS Central Pennsylvania and the Northeast Military Modelers Association and will take the place of ArmorCon 2020. We will continue to monitor information provided by government officials and medical professionals and, if it becomes necessary, make a decision on whether we can continue with AMPS 2020 at Danbury, CT approximately 30 days before our scheduled event.

The Radisson Hotel Harrisburg has automatically cancelled all individual reservations without penalty if these reservations were made using the convention code as advertised through the AMPS website. If you made reservations outside the AMPS room block, you will need to individually cancel those reservations. We will post reservation instructions for the Crown Plaza Danbury, CT on the AMPS website as soon as they are available.

We've posted on the AMPS website and Facebook page the refund policy for registrants, vendors and sponsors. If for any reason you're unable to attend AMPS 2020, we encourage you to consider attending AMPS 2021, 29 April to 1 May 2021 in Newport News, VA.

We want to thank **Peter Espada**, Show Chair, his AMPS Central Pennsylvania show staff, and the Northeast Military Modelers Association for their time and cooperation in rescheduling AMPS 2020.

In closing, we wish everyone and their families' good health and encourage them to take appropriate safety precautions in regard to this virus. If, for any reason, you are unable to attend AMPS 2020, we encourage you to consider attending AMPS 2021, 29 April to 1 May 2021 in Newport News, VA.

Nevertheless, we look forward to seeing everyone at the AMPS 2020 International Convention in Danbury, CT 24 to 26 September 2020.

Build Review

STAR WARS TX-225 GAVW OCCUPIER COMBAT ASSAULT TANK

ccording to the Star Wars Wiki, Wookieepedia, the TX-225 GAVw "Occupier" is a track-propelled ground assault vehicle used by the Galactic Empire. Crewed by a commander and two pilots, it can also be used for transporting heavy payloads on its cargo bed, such as kyber crystals as seen in the streets of the Holy City of Jedha in Rogue One: A Star Wars Story.

In case you wonder if the TX-225 in Rouge One was constructed from a real tank, the answer is yes, but no, it wasn't a T-34! Lucasfilm crew used a CVR(T) Stormer in a flat-bed configuration instead. These days many retired British armor vehicles are enjoying their second careers as "Hollywood Panzers," and



such is the case for the TX-225. Another fine example that I know of is a working StuG III replica in The Museum of the American G.I. at College Station, TX.


No one makes a kit of the TX-225 in 1/35th yet (although I very much like to see one from Bandai!). If you don't want to dive into scratchbuilding (or 3-D printing) one, maybe you should check out Fantasy Flight Supply's (www.fantasyflightgames.com) TX-225 unit expansion, the subject of this review.



Inside the box is a snap kit of the Occupier along with two half-figures (pilot/driver and commander), two "unique" machinegun (MG34 look alike) options, and three kyber crystal pods (squirrel traps!). Quick measurements of both vehicle and figures confirmed that they are almost $1/48^{\rm th}$ scale, which suites this quarterscale modeler just fine. The double-sided instruction sheet contains detailed assembly directions (very helpful) on one side and the expansion game rules (no use at all, at least to us modelers!) on the other.

Contrary to other snap kits, this TX-225 model has fairly decent details. I chose mostly not to modify or enhance any and built it pretty much straight out of the box.

The bulk of the work of putting the tank together was already done by the poor souls in a Chinese sweat shop. That only leaves us modelers with less than ten parts to finish the rest of the assembly. The wheels are molded in half and into the lower hull, so I didn't have to do a single thing. The track run on each side contains just three sections: the long one for the bottom and two short ones that touch (but not wrap around) the driving sprockets and idler wheels.



Once assembled, the overly simplified track runs look quite convincing.



Next I tackled the two twin-mounted cannons on each side of the tank. Again there are obvious seams on the barrels that run down the cooling fins. They are, pardon my carefully chosen word, a "female dog" to clean! Why would the Empire in a galaxy far far away employ early 20th century terrene technology to cool their weapons is way beyond me!



Anyway, by the time I finished cleaning the seams, I was in no mood to do the same to yet another twin-



mounted guns under the bow. So I snapped them off, installed a 1/35th MG34 barrel to make it look like a flamethrower nozzle, and called it a day! Ah, the best part of sci-fi modeling: nobody can accuse you of any historical inaccuracy in your work!

To close or not to close, that's the next question, hatchwise. I reckon the pilot/driver needs to know where he is going, so I glued his hatch in open position. Before I did that, I had to fill the big ejection pin mark on the inside of his hatch first. At this point I noticed something inconsistent about this kit: while the tank model is molded in hard plastic, the figures and the machineguns are not. They are the soft vinyl kind but not as "chewy" as green army men. You don't use glue to attach body parts; you just push the stubs in



the arms into the sockets on the torso. The pilot/driver was not a problem as he is a quadriplegic. But the tank commander is supposed to be either holding the machinegun on a swivel mount or hanging on to the edge of the hatch opening. I couldn't get his hands to

do either in a convincing pose. So I decided he better stays inside the tank. Hatch/case closed!

Once that was done, I had no more parts to glue, but that was not the end of assembly. Apparently the work done by the sweat shop folks was not up to par with any decent modeler's standards. Between the upper and lower hulls, there were gaps, seams, sprue scars, and, worst of all, alignment problems. All that needed a lot of filling and sanding. I kept telling myself "fix the big and obvious issues and ignore the small ones" as I didn't want to turn this little weekend project into a shelf-queen! So all the imperfections in



Fantasy Flight Supply's rendition of the TX-225 is quite good, considering it is nothing but a snap kit for gamers. Its MSRP is on the high side (\$59.95!), but I was able to purchase it locally at the Game Goat (6929 Airport Blvd #134, Austin, TX) for less than \$45. Recommended.




