

reetings! As I write this, it is my hope that the worst of this pandemic is over. However, we may not get venues open for us to meet until after Labor Day (assuming the number of COVID-19 cases is decreasing, of course). We have quite a few things that are on hold such as officer elections and the toon tank contest. On a positive note, we should have several demos that could be rescheduled to help fill out the calendar for next year.

At any rate, seventy-five years ago, VJ Day effectively ended World War II. That occurred on the 15th of August 1945. However, the formal surrender of Japan on board USS Missouri would not take place until September. As the announcement of

Japan's Emperor would accept the Allies' terms unconditional οf surrender, celebrations erupted worldwide. The world by this time had entered the nuclear age. Before the surrender of Japan, the United States had used atomic bombs destroy most of to Hiroshima and Nagasaki.



Seventy years ago, the Korean War was entering its third month of fighting. On the 2nd of August, a North Korean assault was repelled during the Battle of Notch. On the 4th of August, the U.S. 8th Army, under command of General Walton Walker, the established the Pusan Perimeter. This defensive line would stretch for 140 miles (230km) to protect the

southeast portion of the Korean Peninsula. Although the fighting would be desperate to keep the entire country from being overrun by the communists of North Korea, the American forces were starting to rack up victories. North Korean assaults would be repulsed at several points along the line.

Interesting enough, as the North Korean offensive actions were being checked, the Red Chinese were already debating on intervening in the war. What was helping the 8th Army defensive stance was that supplies were getting through, and the supply lines were now quite short. Also, heavy weapons were arriving through the port of Pusan along with reinforcements.

Another huge benefit for the 8th Army was that Air Force and Naval support was now being effectively coordinated. After several battles collectively known as the Pusan Perimeter Battle, a pattern was developing. North Korean tanks and infantry would assault the perimeter at various points. They would be repulsed with heavy losses, and as they pulled back to disengage, they would be bombed and strafed by the US Air Force to inflict even more casualties.

The month of August in 1950 would also mark other changes in the Korean War. The effort against communist aggression would start to become a United Nations action as other countries started to commit forces to the peninsula.

As a final note, one event that would seem almost insignificant at the time occurred on the 3rd of August, 1950. On that day, thirty-five US soldiers arrived in Saigon as the American Military Assistance Advisory Group. They were deployed to assist the French effort in Vietnam by helping to train Vietnamese forces loyal to France. The communist backed Vietnamese were already racking up victories over the French by this time.

Well, that is a wrap on the history, in the meantime, keep building and painting! Thanks to all members of AABS for making this organization one of the very best! Hopefully, things will start returning to a more normal time.

AMPS 2020 International Convention is CANCELLED!

Friends,

It is with great sadness that we inform you AMPS 2020 International Convention is CANCELLED. Out of an abundance of caution and concern for the safety and welfare of our convention participants (members, vendors, volunteers and attendees alike), the AMPS E-Board has unanimously decided that we must cancel our annual event.

With this said, we need to explain a bit of what has gone into this decision. **AMPS Central Pennsylvania**

and the Show Committee has been busy planning and adjusting these plans in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. As you know, our initial plan was to hold our convention in early May 2020 at Camp Hill, PA. The Governor of Pennsylvania's response to COVID-19 forced us to postpone our event to late September 2020 and move it to Danbury, CT. We were very fortunate that Northeast Military Modelers Association offered the Society their time slot and hotel where they normally hold ArmorCon. However, the recent decision by the Governor of Connecticut to continue in Phase Two reopening for an indefinite time severely limits the number of people who can attend indoor meetings and gatherings. The Governor of Connecticut also placed quarantine restrictions on people arriving from states on the travel advisory list. This quarantine impacts the ability of potential convention attendees and vendors to participate in the event. Additionally,



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there are travel restrictions in-place which preclude many of our international visitors from attending the convention without undergoing quarantine.

Currently, the Danbury Crown Plaza is uncertain when it will be able to reopen for business. The hotel has agreed to cancel our convention with no penalty to AMPS. Additionally, the hotel will cancel all individual reservations with no cancellation penalty if you booked a reservation using code AMP. You are responsible for canceling your reservations if you booked outside the AMP group.

We've published a convention refund policy on the AMPS website home page. Chris Graeter, our Vendor Coordinator, will be reaching out to each vendor and Glen Martin, our Sponsorship Coordinator, will be in contact with the show sponsors concerning refunds or carryovers to AMPS 2021. Chuck Rothman, our Web Master, will be reaching out to those who pre-registered for the show concerning refund or carry over to AMPS 2021.

The AMPS E-Board decided to continue the AMPS 2020 show theme ("Last Battles") to AMPS 2021. We'll have two themes in 2021 with two separate trophies. This will allow those who built entries for the 2020 show theme an opportunity to compete for that award next year.

"Loony Toon-Tanks!" 2020 2nd Quarterly Contest

ive l'amour! Love may be what Pepé Le Pew is into, but for us modelers, it's definitely the "amour" part that gets our attention!

The theme for our 2020 second quarterly contest is "Looney Toon-Tanks!" These whimsical egg-shaped models are fun, easy to build, and perfect for a weekend project! Should you want to make them more challenging, there are all kinds of not-too-serious conversions (e.g. Sherman Calliope, Bergtiger, T-34/85) that you can attempt.

Go build a Toon-Tank now. That's all, forks!



T-54/55 Group Build

ere's a trivial question for you all tank enthusiasts: what's the most produced tank of all time? No, it's not Sherman or T-34, and yes, the honor goes to the Soviet T-54/55! With so many paint schemes and upgrades open for modelers, it is a logical choice as the subject of a group project.

Here are the criteria of this T-54/55 group build:

- 1/35th scale only
- Must have gun (or guns) of caliber 57mm or larger (i.e. ZSU-57-2 and SU-122/54 are okay but NO armored recovery, APC, bridging, or firefighting variant, please).
- No operator restriction (Angola, China, Cuba, Czechoslovakia, DDR, Egypt, Finland, Iraq, Israel, North Korea, Poland, USSR/Russia, Vietnam, former Yugoslavia states, etc. are all welcomed).
- 4BO is optional! (i.e. feel free to paint your tank any color other than standard Russian Green as long as your color scheme is historically accurate)
- Please close all hatches and DO NOT glue your model to a base!

We are aiming for a group entry in this year's ASMS Capital Classic show in October 2020. So the rendezvous point for our T-54/55s is the **September club meeting**. That leaves us less than six months to build, paint, and weather our models. If you haven't started yet, you need to get a move on NOW. Ura!

crew. Henry did an analysis of the interweb photo I e-mailed him, and he came up with the colors that I needed.



I'll share the list of colors with you. The colors are Vallejo with the exception of one Panzer Aces color.

Base Layer: Olive Drab Green

- V-924 Russian Uniform 85%
- V-887 Brown Violet 10%
- V- 881Yellow Green 5%

Brown

- V-826 Camo Medium Brown 85%
- V-872 Chocolate Brown 15%

Green

- V-968 Flat Green 90%
- V-850 Medium Green 10%

Black Brown

V-822 Black Camo Brown 100%

Off White Specs

- Panzer Aces-345 Splinter Camo Base
 - or
- V- 820 Off White 95%
- V-989 Sky Grey 5%

To get the real effect of cloth you can use a flattener in your paints to get the real effect (e.g. Reaper 09215 Anti-Shine Additive or Tamiya Base Layer).

I swapped the kit head out with a Hornet head. The following steps and photos show how I painted the tank commander using Henry's color scheme.

I started off with the base layer of Olive Drab Green. Be sure to refer to your reference photos as you paint the pattern. I added Vallejo 70.845 Sunny Skin Tone to the base color for highlights (1).



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Here's a photo of the highlighted figure with the second color (Brown) added (2).

Next up is the second green. Then I used a thinned acrylic black wash over the uniform at this point. This darkened the creases of the figure (3).

The black brown was applied next (4).

Last to be added were the white spots (5).

The last step in blending the colors together is spraying the figure with a coat of your favorite flat. I used Alclad's Kote Flat because I like its flat effect.

It's great to have two world class painters as resources that are so willing to share their knowledge. Thanks Bob and Henry for guiding me through the painting process.

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


