

reetings! As I write this, we are getting a blast of winter-like weather, but at least the house is warm and my coffee is hot for the moment. The local IPMS folks in Killeen have resumed gathering with the first meeting held in October at the University (Texas A & M Central Texas). I hope we can also resume ours in a very near future.

In November, 1950, it was cold in North Korea, but the fighting went hot again. After two months of stunning successes against the North Korean Army, the UN forces are now experiencing the onslaught of Red Chinese forces.

On the 2nd of November, 380 soldiers of the 3rd Battalion, 8th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Cavalry Division were listed as missing in action as they were overrun by the Chinese during the opening stages of the Battle of Unsan. The battle would end two days later as a Chinese victory.

The UN forces, comprising elements of the US Army, the United Kingdom and Australian troops, won a fight against the Red Chinese during the Battle Pakchon on the 5th of November. The Aussies would be in the thick of the fighting during this battle.

Mao Anying

On the 25th of November the Red Chinese lost Mao Anying, son of Mao Zedong, in action while serving in the headquarters of the Chinese army in North Korea. The death of the reputed favorite son of the Chinese leader may have been a factor for the war dragging on as long as it did.

Meanwhile, the Battle of Chongchon also began on the 25^{th} , and it would eventually end as a Red Chinese victory. Interesting enough, in this fight the UN forces held a slight numerical advantage.

On the 27th of November 1950, the marines of the 1st Marine Division were heavily engaged by the Red Chinese at the Chosin Reservoir. This fight would drag on into December.






