reetings! We had a very good Christmas party thanks to all who attended. Thanks again to Eric Choy and Kevin Hutchison for the roles they played making it happen. Eric won our toon tank contest. Ironically, I got a toon tank kit from the CTSMS Christmas gift exchange! Too bad it was not in time for our contest!

As I write this, we are on the verge of 2021, and although the libraries are not open for us yet, Eric has made plans for us to meet temporarily at the Wingate Round Rock Hotel and Conference Center (the same place where we had our Christmas Party back in December last year). More details can be found on page one of this newsletter.

Seventy years ago, in the Battle of Vin Yen, the French inflicted a severe defeat on the Viet Minh. This battle raged from 13th to 17th of January, 1950. It temporarily turned the tide in favor of the French in Indochina.

In Korea, UN forces were trying to stabilize the front lines as the Red Chinese and resurgent North Korean

armies continued their push southward. The Battle of Uijeongbu took place on the 1st of January and ended three days later. Casualties were light, but it was a Communist victory as British and Australian troops were forced to retreat.

A big change took place in the US 8th Army, however. General Matthew Ridgeway was now in command, succeeding General Walker who was killed just before Christmas. Ridgeway was anxious to stabilize the front and go back on the offensive. He shook up the command and staff structure and formulated a new tactical doctrine emphasizing heavier use of artillery power. Ridgeway had also received permission from his superior, General Douglas MacArthur, to run the 8th Army as he saw fit. For now, Ridgeway conceded the lost of Seoul as top priority was given to stop the retreat of UN forces.

On the 10th of January, Operation Pohang began. The goal of this operation was to eliminate North Korean forces operating guerilla style after being trapped behind the UN defensive lines. Rather than surrender or attempt to break through to their own main forces, approximately 16,000 North Korean soldiers continued the fight behind the UN forward positions.

On the 20th of January, the second Battle of Wonju ended in an UN victory. The first battle saw the South Korean city of Wonju fall to the Chinese and North Korean forces. This time the UN forces did not reclaim Wonju but push the communists out of the city into the range of artillery fire and air strikes. As General Ridgeway had desired, UN forces went on the offensive with Operation Thunderbolt on January 25th.

That is all for now. Thanks to all who make this club one of the very best! May the year 2021 turn out well for all of our members and their families.


