

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very once in a while an indispensable modeling tool comes along that makes me wonder how I managed all these years without it. One of these gadgets recently I come across is Glue Mount 2 by the Japanese company Asunarow.

Before I describe what this product can do, let's get one thing straight: sooner or later, we WILL all spill the glue bottle!



It's an inevitable accident waiting to happen regardless of how careful we are. It doesn't matter what your glue of choice is, even the mighty Tamiya square bottle for Extra Thin Cement falls victim to tip-over. In my opinion, it has very little to do with clumsiness. Dictated (and also probably cursed!) by the nature of our hobby, we just have too many objects in our work areas!

So what can we do to avoid a potential spillage situation? That's where this product from Asunarow comes in. Basically, it is a holding base to secure your Tamiya square bottle on your work bench. Unlike other similar products, Glue Mount 2 has room for not just one, but two bottles. You can have different combinations like two

From the Turret

reetings! We had a good meeting in January, although the turnout was understandably light. We did decide to have a contest in March with a theme of T-54/T-55 models in 1/35th scale (see page 5).

A few years back when I replaced **John Talley** as the club's President, I followed his theme of writing about military events that occurred 75 years ago for the *From the Turret* column. Once that theme got us through the WWII, I switched to writing about events 70 years back with the main focus on the Korean War. The first several months of the Korean War

was quite interesting with a lot of shifts in momentum as the fighting unfolded. However, the war began to turn into a stalemate. Fighting continued to occur with casualties mounting, but there were no serious changes in momentum for either side. Much of the restraints on military action was imposed by political powers concerned that this local conflict could spread and even possibly lead to nuclear weapons being used.

With all things considered, I have decided to close the look-back theme and start something new (see below) that features a tank each month to write a summary about. Since we will be having a contest in March with T-54/T-55 tanks, I thought it's a logical choice as the subject to debut my new column.

Thanks to all who make this club one of the very best! May 2021 turn out well for all of our members and their families.

T-54/55

he T-54/T-55 tank series holds the record as the most-produced tank ever; close to 100,000 have been manufactured. It had the advantage of being a simple but robust tank. When it first arrived on the scene during the early days of the Cold War, it was deemed a better tank than those fielded by western armies at that time.

Although it was never used against NATO forces directly, it has served in numerous wars. It was used in the Vietnam War by the North Vietnamese. In fact, an iconic photograph of a T-54 crashing through the gates of the Presidential Palace in South Vietnam has become symbolic of the final North Vietnamese victory.

The T-54/T-55 was also a symbol of Soviet hard line policy against dissent within the Warsaw pact. A few examples include the Hungarian Revolution (1956), Prague Spring (1968), and martial law in Poland (1983).

T-54/T-55 tanks were heavily used by Egyptian and Syrian forces during the Six Day war. Tiran5, captured

T-55 tanks modified and used by the IDF, continued to serve in Israel's reserve forces until 1990. The T-55 tank was used again by Egypt and Syria during the Yom Kippur War in 1973, even though the better T-62 usually spearheaded Arab armored assaults.

Another extensive use of T-54/T-55 tanks was the Iran-Iraq War from 1980-1988. Its usage was prominent in the eventual Iraqi victory. However, during Operation Desert Storm, when again used by the Iraqis, it proved no match for coalition armor and air power.

In spite of being superseded by more modern designs, Russia did not completely phase out their T-55s until 2012. It was used heavily by Soviet forces during their incursion into Afghanistan. Even today this tank is still being used in various parts of the world such as the ongoing Yemini Civil War, which started in 2015.

Next Quarterly Contest (March 2021) Theme is:

T-54/55

n case you haven't heard, our first quarterly contest of 2021 will be held at the March meeting/modeling day. Since we all spent effort last year working on our T-54/55s, the club decided at the January meeting to make it the theme of that contest. Again, here are the criteria:

- 1/35th scale only
- Must have gun (or guns) of caliber 57mm or larger (i.e. ZSU-57-2 and SU-122/54 are okay but NO armored recovery, APC, bridging, or firefighting variant, please).
- No operator restriction (Angola, China, Cuba, Czechoslovakia, DDR, Egypt, Finland, Iraq, Israel, North Korea, Poland, USSR/Russia, Vietnam, former Yugoslavia states, etc. are all welcomed).
- 4BO is optional! (i.e. feel free to paint your tank any color other than standard Russian Green as long as your color scheme is historically accurate)



Extra Thin Cement bottles or an Extra Thin Cement together with a Liquid Surface Primer. Since I use both regular and quick-setting Extra Thin cements, I place one of each in my mount to make them handy for any occasion.





But wait! There is more! The hollow bottom inside each holding compartment allows the bottle to tilt at 45° in four directions. This allows you to get the most out of a bottle when it is less than half full (see photo on the right). Now that's clever!

The mount also has four pre-drilled holes (two 11mm \varnothing and two 5.85mm \varnothing) to hold brushes. I find them placed at awkward positions (between the two holding compartments) and are a distraction from the true purpose of this tool: to secure glue bottles from tipping over. But if you can find a use for them, more power to you!



Made from laser-cut MDF, Glue Mount 2 comes unassembled. It only takes a few minutes to snap the parts together (no glue is required), and voilà, no more spillage (let's hope!) and more bang for your buck out of your glue bottle!

Asunarow's Glue Mount 2 is available at Hobby Link Japan (www.hlj.com) for ¥1100 (about USD

\$11). Beware: being one of the hottest sale items, it's always backordered. If you can't wait, **BNA Model World (www.bnamodelworld.com)** from Australia also carries it, but the price is higher (AUD \$21.50, about USD \$16.38).







B order Models' new 1/35th Crusader III kit comes with a metal barrel, and the suspension is workable. All the hatches and stowage compartment doors can be posed in open positions, a far cry from the old Italeri kit.

Trumpeter just released the infamous 5cm FlaK41 in 1/35th scale. Less than 200 were made during the war as the gun was considered mostly a failure due to its instability when fired AND being towed.





Not to be confused with Revell Germany's 1/72nd GTK Boxer series of vehicles, this A2 variant is a brand new tool from Dragon. It's nice to see something new from DML, for a change!

Yep, the upcoming quarterscale release from Tamiya is a T-34/85. Somewhat disappointing subject, in my opinion!
