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How to Paint the Face of a 1/35th Figure

ver the last couple of years, I have admittedly been slacking in my armor builds. Instead, I focused on painting figures. I've made videos and have been fortunate to be able to assist in Andrea Miniature workshops but I've yet to put into a clear and concise article until now. For this I will be using Alpine Miniatures' British AFV Crew #1 (#35178).

After the figure was assembled, Brite-Touch Gray Primer (available at most automotive parts stores) was used to prepare for paint. It's



an awesome stuff: it dries in 15 minutes and is super smooth.

Starting with the eyes is key for me. Utilizing Vallejo's Light Flesh, I fill in the eye socket. Using pure black, I draw in the pupil then pull a line across the top of the eyelid. Another way to do this is to paint the socket black then tap in the Light Flesh. Personally I've found this useful on days when my shakes are trying to keep me from painting.

Centurion Tank

The featured tank for this month is the British Centurion tank. In the past several months I have been working on a model of an IDF Centurion (Sho't) from the Yom Kippur War of 1973. I have almost finished with a Korean War Centurion (see page 11) and have started an Australian Vietnam War Centurion model. All are AFV Club kits. Yes, I am a glutton for punishment, but I really like the tank and its legacy.

The British Centurion was being developed during World War Two. The Brits were having a hard go of it against German armor, not to mention the use of the 88mm FlaK gun in an anti-tank role. And as the Tiger and Panther tanks started appearing on the battlefront, the need for better tanks was painfully apparent.

Centurions first appeared in 1945 but were too late to be used in WWII. Between 1946 and 1962, 4,423 Centurions were produced. Many would later be converted to Armored Recovery Vehicles or Armored Personnel Carriers once they were obsolete for service as a main battle tank.

The Centurion Mk.IIIs were deployed to Korea with the 8^{th} King's Royal Irish Hussars in late 1950. They enjoyed great success in the Korean War in both offensive and defensive roles.



During the 1965 Indo-Pakistani War, Centurions Mk.7s operated by the Indian Army totally outfought M47 and M48 Patton tanks operated by Pakistan. After action analysis concluded the Centurion was a much better tank than either of the mentioned Patton tanks.

During the Vietnam War the Australians operated Centurion Mk.Vs as infantry support tanks. They proved their worth just in their ability to push through heavy vegetation that often limited the use of American made M113 APCs. In Vietnam, the armored side skirts were removed by the Australians because of mud and vegetation issues.



Israeli Sho't (modified Centurions) gained fame during the Six Day War of 1967 and the Yom Kippur War of 1973. In one battle during the Yom Kippur War, approximately 125 Sho't tanks soundly



defeated a Syrian force fielding over 500 T-55 and T-62 tanks.

By the 1980s however, the Centurion was becoming outclassed and obsolete. The British Army had already replaced the Centurion with the Chieftain tank, which in turn has been replaced by the Challenger series of main battle tanks. However, during the first Gulf War (1990), Centurion Mk.Vs modified to serve as armored recovery vehicles were still in use and deployed by the Royal Engineers.

During its service life, numerous nations have used the Centurion in their armored forces. Sweden is just one example, as depicted in the picture below.

In conclusion, the Centurion was an awesome tank during its heyday. During the 1950s and 1960s, it completely outclassed its contemporary opponents. In combat, it gained a solid reputation for its ability to destroy the enemy and to withstand heavy punishment.

There are many ways to approach flesh tones. My preferred method is to start with the mid tone then work up to the highlights. This makes it easier when applying the shadows. Also, you can decide how much contrast you would like to push. I like a lot of contrast, but some modelers may prefer a toned down look.

To create my first mid-tone, I mix Pink-Flesh, Burnt Flesh, Moss Green, and a small touch of Violet. Violet is a very strong pigment, so adding a small amount at a time is suggested.



While I've read that you want to thin the paint to a milk-like consistency, I always wonder "What kind of milk?"! Using the end of the paint brush to add drops of water, I stir the mixture until the paint starts to pull in on itself. Play with this because it's really kinda cool to see the paint changes consistency.



Once the base coat of mid-tone is done, the first highlights is added. It is imperative at this point to slowly add to the base mix essentially blending as you go. Vallejo Sunny Skin Tone is one of my go-to paints for just about everything not just flesh. Each time you add a highlight, you want to decrease the area of the application.







Vallejo's basic Flesh is now applied. This is when you should start to see "The Glow!" For me, things start to get exciting because the previous layers can seem a daunting task. This is when the highlights really take shape.





Once you are satisfied with highlights, it's time to move into shadows and "blood flow" to the figure. At this point the figure's flesh is kinda monotone. Using controlled thin layers of paint, I outline the face. Colors used in this mix are violet and Burnt Skin. Another great option is Vallejo's Cav Brown.

Depending on how much contrast you prefer, adding black helps. These layers of acrylic paint are super thin and may need several applications for a smooth finish.

Inks have become one of my favorite tools in my paint rack. They are great for adding color to our normally drab acrylics. Scale75, Andrea, and Liquitex all make great ink products that are water based and mix really well together. The inks might create a shine, but this is easily fixed with a matte medium or varnish mixed in. Be careful though as it could create a build up of latex, so use sparingly.



For this example I used Black and "Inktense Crimson" from Scale75. The Beret and hairline are also painted using black and burnt skin.

Turquoise is great for adding a five o clock shadow. Just like Sunny Skin Tone, I mix it lightly into the base flesh mix and heavily diluted with water. Games Workshop shade colors were used to add contrast at this point and smooth the face out a little more.



At this point, you can step back and look at the overall face and make any adjustments as you see fit.

That is my approach to painting flesh tones. I hope this is helpful with your figure painting. The only thing cooler than an armor model is an armor model with a cool figure interacting with it.

AMPS 2021 is Rescheduled To April 7-9, 2022

Dear Friends,

I suspect many of you already had a feeling this notice would come. I can't tell you how so disappointed we are. Along with the unanimous support from AMPS leadership and our show committee, we have decided to **Reschedule** our AMPS 2021 International Convention. We considered what is best for the safety of everyone involved, as well as a responsibility to do what is right and best for the membership of the organization.

However, there is good news!!!

We have worked out an available date for the 2022 show. We will simply move this year's show its location, theme, special awards including the original 2020 theme to April 7-9, 2022 at the Marriott at City Center, Newport News, VA. The Marriott has graciously kept all room pricing and arrangement the same for the 2022 show.

There are many factors involved in this decision the most of which include:

- Virginia has instituted tight COVID-19 restrictions where we essentially can't have more than ten people in a meeting room. While COVID-19 vaccinations are progressing and we are seeing a decrease in cases, we don't know what restrictions will be placed on us to host a show in Virginia.
- The show team needs at least 60 days to ramp up many of the final details for the show: gather sponsors, get tee shirts, trophy's, and finalize show prep.
- The Show team considered a number of options

for holding the AMPS International Convention during 2021; however, we still don't have a clear path (COVID wise) for later in the year.

Some brief housekeeping notes from members, participants, and vendors:

- The hotel will cancel all individual reservations with no cancellation penalty if you booked through the online reservation system. You will need to register for the 2022 show. We will send out a follow-up notice on the AMPS website and Facebook page as soon as the Marriott has cancelled all AMPS 2021 reservations.
- Vendor Coordinator Chris Graeter will be reaching out to each vendor with specific guidance concerning refunds or carry over to AMPS 2022.
- Sponsorship Coordinator Zach Hudson will be reaching out to each sponsor with specific guidance concerning refunds or carry over to AMPS 2022.





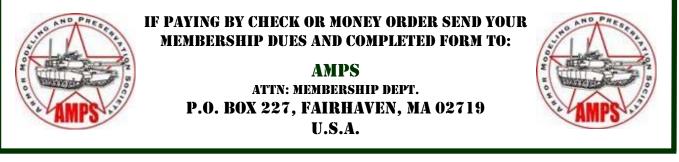

WIESEL A1


M60A3 w/ M9 BULLDOZER

Krupp intended to copy the Soviet T-34's slanted frontal armor for the 'H' version of the Panzer IV, but the increased weight put unacceptable strain on the tank's transmission and brakes. The design was not accepted, and the Panther tank was chosen for production instead.



f you like small tanks (tankettes) in big scale, you don't want to miss Takom's latest 1/16th Wiesel A1 TOW (top left). Over 200 of these Wiesel variants were produced for the Bundeswehr between 1979 and 1993. Takom plans to release the plain AWC version with the 20mm autocannon next.

Also new from Takom is their M60A3 with M9 Bulldozer in 1/35th scale (bottom left).

CM has been busy with WWI armored cars lately, but we are glad to see a few WWII subjects being released also. One of them is this 1/35th Leyland Retriever early production 6x4 truck.
