

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FOR MODELERS AFRAID OF PHOTOETCHED PARTS

any outstanding models that we have seen at model shows or on the Internet are basic kits enhanced with photoetched (PE) parts. In the past PE sets were mostly aftermarket upgrades offered by Eastern European cottage industries. Nowadays almost every kit that we buy come with some PE parts. Often Intimated by the vast number of tiny parts, many modelers give up on using them.

DON'T BE AFRAID! Rule number one for using PE is use ONLY the parts that matter to you. Never feel obligated to use everything on the fret, even when the kit-provided parts are more detailed. A good example is the PE grab handles that come with many sets as 2-D parts. Use wire which is 3-D and round like the real thing. Throw away the flat stuff. Depending on the type of metal and thickness, they can be very delicate and require extra care to handle.

PE parts are great for replicating engine grills and other thin details that are impossible to depict in plastic. Another fine attribute of PE parts is that they can be bent (or beat up) to show wear and tear or battle damage (e.g. Shurtzen on WWII German tanks). However, the teensy parts can definitely be fodder for the carpet monster. Many parts need to be folded which can also scare some of us. Some companies like Aber even go overboard in making WORKABLE tool clamps!

Next we have the mandatory picture of a Sherman. Then we have our own **Mike Maloney** as a living historian (thanks for the passes, Mike!). AND since our








April meeting falls on the first day of Passover, we have a Jewish chaplain's Torah.

Folding PE parts is where most of us cringe and back off. There are multiple methods, some of which can be very time and effort consuming. Long folds are best done with a clamp-down tool and a razor blade to fold it up.



Tamiya makes a nice flat jawed pliers that works well on most smaller parts. I recently discovered by trial and error my new favorite method for folding: most PE parts have a slight scribed line where a fold should be made. A DULL X-Acto blade can be lightly



drawn along the scribed line two or three times to break the rigidity. Then press downward with the dull blade onto something soft, such as your hand. A perfect fold every time! Annealing by passing the photoetched part over a flame such as a candle will soften the part, but be careful not to melt the metal or make it too soft. Its best use is when you need to roll the part into a cone or tube.

PE parts cannot be glued onto the model or onto each other with styrene cement. You must use epoxy, cyanoacrylate (superglue), or acrylic gel medium (e.g. Gator Grip.) Epoxy is too messy, and most superglue is too brittle. However, acrylic gel medium remains flexible when set, although it takes a long while to set. My go-to cement is Super Weld by JB Weld. It is a bit more flexible than most superglues; this can avoid the PE part from "pinging" off at the wrong moment.

A good coat of primer over the whole completed model with its PE parts already attached not only sets a great base for painting but also adds a second adhesive coating.

PE parts can add great detailing to models, but they can be intimidating to work with. Don't be afraid to use them. It's only a hobby, after all. Work smart, not hard.

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
