

by James Lucas


This is a great read. The sections on German SPs are very interesting. Model to build: StuG III.

By Raymond Bagdonas



The first one is U.S. Army's **2-8-0** "Consolidation" **No. 2630.** Upon America's entry into World War Two, the United States Army Transportation Corps (USATC) commissioned the development of a locomotive which could be built quickly and inexpensively in large numbers to be deployed on railways around the world. The result was the S-160 class, a 2-8-0 Consolidation locomotive limited in size and weight to ensure compatibility with Europe's lighter construction of rail lines.

A total of 2,120 S-160's, nicknamed "Yanks" by the British, were built by the combined efforts of the three major American locomotive builders. The engines saw service in North Africa, Asia, Great Britain, South America, and almost all of Europe.

In November of 1943, No. 2630 rolled out of Baldwin's assembly shop in Philadelphia. Unlike most of its sister engines which were sent off to war, No. 2630 remained stateside for use in railroad operation and maintenance training at the U.S. Army Transportation School at Ft. Eustis, Virginia.

Renumbered No. 612 in 1954, the engine remained on active duty for the Ft. Eustis Military Railroad for years. The Army kept operating steam locomotives to ensure no knowledge would be lost in the event that military operations began in a country that is still running them.

In 2019, the engine received a complete cosmetic restoration of backdating to its as-built appearance and renumbering back to 2630.

Next, we have U.S. Navy's **0-6-0T No. 4**. Supporting the Brooklyn Navy yard's operations required immense shipments of raw materials and equipment, mostly by rail. A fleet of switch engines, including 0-6-0T No. 4, was employed to move incoming and outgoing cars.

Built in March 1919 by Pittsburgh's H.K. Porter Company, No. 4 spent three years with the U.S. Navy before being sold to the neighboring Brooklyn East District Terminal (BEDT) Railroad. For the following three decades, the BEDT's diminutive steamers chuffed around the Brooklyn docks. In fact,

the BEDT was 100% steam until Christmas Day, 1963 when the line finally retired its fleet of steam locomotives. Which meant I most likely saw it operating growing up in NYC.

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HETZER KEGURGITATION

ach year when I attend AMPS International Convention, I always participate in the raffle drawing. Sometimes I get lucky and receive something good. Well, this year I didn't... I won an old Italeri 1/35th Hetzer kit! As I have built it at least two (or three!) times since I joined the hobby in the fifth grade, I was curious to find out more about the kit itself. Little did I realize I may be dealing with the most repopped kit in the history of plastic models!

According to Scalemates (www.scalemates.com), the Internet scale modeling database, Italeri's Hetzer was first released in 1972 (boxart 1) under stock number 209. Italeri was still spelled "Italaerei" at the time! In the late 1970s (or early 1980), this kit was re-issued in a new boxing featuring a finish built by François Verlinden (boxart 2).

During the mid 1970s, Italeri decided to expand into the global hobby market. To make its products more accessible, the company partnered with first Revell then

Testors here in the U.S. to sell its kits at a discount. Each time a different box (boxart 3, 4, 5) was used, but the contents inside were exactly the same.

In the Far East, Italeri teamed up with Tomy (boxart 6) in Japan at first. Later, even Tamiya was repackaging Hetzer #209 (boxart 7) until its own version of the Hetzer was released in 2007!



In 2016, Italeri re-issued the then 44-years-old Hetzer kit once again, but its stock number was renumbered to 6531 (boxart 8). The awful rubber band tracks were finally replaced

by link-and-length parts (see photo below) taken from Italeri's Marder III kit #6566.





Oddly a year later in 2017 when the same Hetzer kit was offered in the "World of Tanks" series (boxart 9), the rubber band tracks reappeared!!!

Currently (June 2023), all $1/35^{th}$ Hetzer kits are labeled "Discontinued" on Italeri's website. Is this the end of the line for the mold? Will we ever see yet another "regurgitated" release of this kit? Who knows? Stranger things have happened with Italian model kits before!




Fighting Gliders of World War II
