Conversion Review: Accurate Armour 1/35th Snatch Land Rover

f you attended my talk about Scalemates.com at our most recent AABS meeting, you may have noticed that my accent isn't quite as Texan as some of y'all. That's because I grew up in Northern Ireland (where the second person plural is "yousuns" rather than "y'all")!

What does this have to do with armor (or should that be "armour")? I was born in the mid-80s, which means I grew up during the tail-end of the

conflict euphemistically known as "The Troubles," the conflict between republican paramilitaries, such as the IRA, and the British security forces, such as the Army and the Royal Ulster Constabulary (i.e. the police), as well as loyalist paramilitaries like the UVF. This meant that seeing armored vehicles on the streets was a common sight.

Growing up in a small, quiet town, I rarely saw the larger vehicles like the Alvis Saracen. I was born too late to things like Centurion AVRE or armored cars (Saladin and Ferret) which all saw use in the preceding decades. However, because I lived close to the border, British Army patrols and road

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
checkpoints aimed at disrupting weapon smuggling were relatively common, as was their patrol vehicle, the "Snatch" Land Rover.

The Snatch was based on the Land Rover Defender 110 chassis, with lightweight composite armor rear body shell, front bulkhead, and doors all manufactured with pressure formed fiberglass and resin which could withstand small arms fire and, to some extent, explosives. The vehicle has a six-person capacity, and the focus on lightweight materials resulted in a weight under 3,500kg, meaning it could be driven with an ordinary car license.


Over 1,000 were procured from 1991, and they first hit the streets in 1992, allowing soldiers to be deployed quickly to where they were needed in times of unrest. They were an iconic image of conflict in Northern Ireland over the next decade until the decrease in hostilities that followed the Good Friday Agreement, signed in 1998. They were required less over the following years, until the British Army's deployment in Northern Ireland officially ended in 2007.

The Snatch was also deployed operationally to Yugoslavia in the 1990s, and most controversially, to



There is no limit to how many model you enter as long as your entry wasn't placed in our previous quarterly contests.



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
Iraq and Afghanistan in the 2000s when it began to become public knowledge that the vehicle was vulnerable to roadside bombs, leading troops to name it the "Mobile Coffin." At least 37 British servicemen and women lost their lives while travelling in the vehicle, with the government justifying its use as a tradeoff between protection and mobility.

In 2010, the Ocelot was announced as Snatch's replacement and entered service in 2012. However, as of 2023 the UK Government was seeking an extension to the Snatch's 2024 "Out of Service Date."

If you want to build a 1/35th model kit of "The Troubles"-era Snatch Land Rover, the only game in



town is the Accurate Armour update set which requires the chassis from either the Hobby Boss Land Rover 110 kit or Accurate Armour's own "Land Rover 'One Ten' Chassis set." The set includes full upper body with interior, V8 engine, replacement axles, and a full set of road tires with a front mounted spare. Decals for notable "Confidential Telephone Freephone" tip line markings are also included.

The set is available directly from Accurate Armour and currently retails for £53.50 (around USD \$68) including shipping to the USA.

Branson Hobby Center is a very nice hobby shop on the outskirts of Branson, MO and has a great selection of kits, paints, tools, and accessories. It also has a large train related area with lots of great diorama supplies. My wife Terri was nice enough to drive me the two hours to Branson in late April.

When we got there, we realized that the shop was on the second floor up a very long, steep flight of stairs, OUCH. As I sat in my wheelchair looking up



those stairs, I felt completely defeated. Thankfully, Robert, the owner, had planned ahead, and there was a chair lift available. All was right with the world again! I can't say enough good things about this shop and its staff. They were very helpful and welcoming. I guess Robert is my new Rudy now!

On to the show. After the close call at Branson Hobby Center, I contacted the MOSSCON folks about accessibility and was pleasantly surprised to learn that the show was being held at the ARC of the Ozarks facility, specifically designed to serve its special needs clientele. So access was a breeze!



When we arrived, we were greeted by members of MOSS. With my carts in tow, they were extremely helpful unloading all my paint racks and taking them to my table. This was a great surprise and something every show should offer. Again, just like the hobby shop, everyone was very welcoming, and I truly felt like they were happy to have us at the show.

After I got by booth arranged, I set out my dioramas and took a look at all the entries. In all there were 315 models on the tables from 62 modelers. Those modelers were from five different states (AR, IL, KS, MO, and OK). Accompanied by 18 vendors, it was a nice size show. The models on display were exactly what you would expect, a wide range of subjects but all good quality work. Since each entrant was limited to ten entries, I think people put much more effort into quality over quantity. I also noticed that unlike

most shows I attended, everything went off like clockwork, on time to the minute.



The judging seemed to move at a good pace, and the awards ceremony started exactly on time and

moved right along. All in all, it was a great first experience for me in my new home. How did I do, you may ask. I was shocked to learn I won first place in dioramas! I have made AABS proud, if I dare say so!



So, it looks like MOSS will soon have a new member. The two-hour drive to Ozark Missouri to attend meetings doesn't sound very fun, but I really did enjoy meeting and talking with the club members. The big part of this hobby, for me, is the friends you make, not just the kits you finish. And if I needed more motivation to make the trip every month, they meet at a pizza place!
