# Doing Snow Canouflage

For some reason I like  $1/16^{th}$  scale models. Gallery Models is a new player in this niche. Their Panzer III kit is excellent, and it rivals the same subject by Das Werk.

This article is intended to cover the application of a whitewash camouflage during the Winter of 1941/42. The original factory paint is RAL 7021 Dunkelgrau (Panzer Gray).

The model was completely sprayed with Krylon's "rattlecan" Red Oxide Primer, followed by two light coats of hairspray as the first step to chipping.

Next was a topcoat of the Panzer Gray (Tamiya XF-63). I allowed a max of 30 minutes of drying time before the chipping process. Meanwhile, I cleaned my airbrush. The chips were made by selectively removing the Panzer Gray to reveal the red primer. It was a slow and laborious process.



After applying the decals, the model sub-assemblies were sprayed with TRESemmé Ultra Fine Hairspray in two misting coats, allowing each coat to dry overnight.

Starting with the turret, a blend of Flat White (XF-2) and Deck Tan (XF-55) was airbrushed over the Panzer Gray. This blending produced a toned-down slightly dirty white shade. A random combination of heavy and light coverage gives a more realistic end result, indicative of a hasty, amateurish paint job applied in the field.



After 30 minutes, I started removing the fresh and still wet whitewash. The object is to make the whitewash look naturally worn, scuffed, and chipped from hard combat use and weathering. This includes heavy crew usage wear points such as handles, climbing/ walking paths, and edges of hatches. One needs to work quickly because the paint is constantly drying and becoming ever harder to remove.

#### From the Turret

## MODELS PAINTS TOOLS ACCESSORIES ROCKETS





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To remove the whitewash, first brush tap water on the selected area. The water softens the acrylic paint and the hairspray underneath. Taking an old paintbrush with stiff bristles, you can brush and scrub the paint. This action causes the paint to lift away along with the exposed hairspray. The dark gray color beneath is now revealed. Because the top paint is actually removed, this provides a more realistic appearance than simply hand painting chips and scratches. It duplicates what happens to real vehicles. This technique is better suited to larger scales (like  $1/16^{\text{th}}$ ) but can be effectively used on the smaller scales also.

I often use a Scotch Brite pad to speed things along. The pad is composed of fine abrasive fibers. I use it to produce webs of small scratches as well as long runs of paint damage on corners. These pads are available in paint stores such as Sherwin-Williams. They are red in color and are about 9"x6".

Due to the larger coverage area, the hull was treated in three separate paint/chip sessions consisting of the upper front, upper rear, and both lower sides. I figured the crew was in a hurry whitewashing their vehicle, and they left the tools, spare tracks, and spare roadwheels in place. The four headlights, however, would have been removed or shielded.



Notice the missing parts (side hatches and commanders cupola) were removed because they required more detail work.

A wash of Dark Brown was used to pick out tiny details and produce shadows around protuberances and general dirty areas. I also washed certain areas of the flat armor plate to simulate isolated dirty areas.



The next step is called "color mapping." This consists of brushing Titanium White artist oil in places where the whitewash pooled or ran. These areas were faded and blended by brushing Zippo lighter fluid over the oil paint.

The weathering mix for lower surfaces below fenders is AV Russian Thick Mud + real dirt (powdered) + water followed by flicking diluted Tamiya Flat Earth (XF-52) and Rubber Black (XF-85).



The tracks received a matching Thick Mud/Real Dirt treatment. I then airbrushed Tamiya Smoke (X-19) to tone down the tracks and create a wet look. This was also sprayed to the lower chassis and the roadwheels.

This concludes the article. The model is a work in progress. I plan to make a base with muddy tank tracks and snow on the ground and on the tank. There will be two figures in the tank and perhaps one or two on the ground.


Tank of the Year - T34 (anything on a T34 chassis)
