Das Werk's PaK40

eveloped between 1939 and 1941, the high velocity 75mm PaK40 (Panzer Abwehr Kanone 40) was an improvement over the 50mm PaK38. It entered service in late 1941 and proved to be an effective weapon against the sloped armor of the Soviet's T-34 and other Allied tanks.



The German model company Das Werk has become a leader in WWII armor kits. Its $1/16^{th}$ PaK40 kit has incredible details and a very high part count (over 300!). Many of them are not used as they are optional. Das Werk kits are not easy to build. They could use more locating pins, and the instructions need clarity.

I built the kit as sub-assemblies. This made it easier to do the painting and chipping over an extended period of time. When all the assemblies were chipped, each was individually washed



and detailed. The gun was ready to be put together.



The many assemblies were painted with a mix of Tamiya Hull Red (XF-9) and Flat Black (XF-1), producing a dark brown/red primer coat. Once completely dried, all the pieces were sprayed with hairspray and were allowed to dry overnight.

The next day certain assemblies were selected for a topcoat of Desert Yellow. After waiting 20 minutes, the chipping began. I finished with one batch of parts first before moving on to another. The reason for doing it this way is if I had painted all the parts in one go, the paint would be too hard to chip. Thus I only painted the parts I could handle and over several sessions the entire model was painted and chipped.

ights, Camera, Action! It's SHOWTIME! At this month's meeting on Wednesday (Oct 8th) we will be going over the details of the show, getting volunteers for Registration and Model Intake, the raffle table, and judging. The program will be a review of the AMPS judging criteria. And of course, bring those models in for Show and Tell. On Thursday the 9th, we will be doing more judging at Eric's place, so we need volunteers for that.

On Oct. 8, 1915,

- Actions of the Hohenzollern Redoubt: Five German regiments attempted to recapture the remaining ground around Hohenzollern Redoubt from the British, but foggy conditions and inaccurate artillery barrages proved inadequate, forcing defending British and French troops from giving up their positions. The Germans suffered 3,000 casualties.
- Battle of Loos: Apart from continued fighting at Hohenzollern Redoubt, the overall British offense faltered due to lack of ammunition, equipment and fresh reinforcements to replenish exhausted units. The British suffered 59,247 casualties, the most of any battle they fought on the Western Front that year. The Germans suffered 51,100 casualties.

On Oct. 8, 1940,

 A large number of German troops entered Romania to train the Romanian Army and protect the country's oil fields. Romania was now effectively under German occupation.

 Charles de Gaulle arrived in Douala, French Cameroons.

On Oct. 8, 1950,

- ◆ Two United States Air Force F-80 fighter-bombers flew more than 60 miles into the Soviet Union and strafed parked airplanes of the 821st Interceptor Aviation Regiment at the Sukhaya Rechka airbase at 4:17pm local time. Fortunately, there were no injuries, and the regiment commander did not pursue the invaders. The United States formally apologized to the Soviet Union on October 18 and offered to pay for the damage, but no response was made to the offer.
- The day after the United Nations had endorsed the unification of Korea, China's Mao Zedong ordered the creation of the People's Volunteer Army and directed General Peng Dehuai to prepare to involve in the Korean War.

On Oct. 8 1965,

◆ The U.S. Army's 173rd Airborne Brigade Combat Team launched the first major American attack on the "Iron Triangle" in South Vietnam, a concentration of Viet Cong guerrillas in an area only 12 miles (19 km) from Saigon.

On Oct. 8, 1970,

- Soviet author Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn was announced as the winner of the Nobel Prize in Literature, but he was not allowed to leave the Soviet Union to accept the award. The Union of Soviet Writers, which had expelled Solzhenitsyn in 1968, said in a statement in the Soviet newspaper Izvestia that "it is deplorable that the Nobel committee allowed itself to be drawn into an unseemly game... prompted by speculative political considerations."
- Matt Damon, American film actor and Oscarwinning screenwriter, was born in Los Angeles.

On Oct. 8 1975,

• Women were allowed admission into the United States Service academies (at West Point, Annapolis, Colorado Springs, New London, and Kings Point) for the first time, as President Gerald Ford signed legislation that included the requirement.

On Oct 8 1980,

 More than 150 people were killed in Iran in the city of Dizful by three Frog-7 missiles fired by Iraq. The Soviet-made missiles, 30 feet (9.1 m) long, were part of an arsenal of 26 such missiles, referred to by NATO as FROG (Free Rocket Over Ground). In another attack on Dizful on October 26, another 100 people were killed when Iraq used three more of the Frog-7 weapons.

Below photos show the front shield pieces in three stages:



Unpainted plastic.



Red/brown primer applied.



Desert Yellow topcoat with the finished chipping.

Next, Mig Dark Wash was applied to the separate pieces and removed with a paper napkin, taking care to keep the orientation in a downward direction to simulate the streaking effect of rain.

When all of the parts were washed, the gun was attached to the elevating mechanism, and the shield was installed.

Broad patches of Tamiya NATO Green (XF-67) camouflage provided a nice contrast to the yellow paint. The gun barrel was given a set of victory rings. I opted to use Tamiya tape to mask the rings and not use any water-slided decals. I chipped the off-white rings to match the chips and wear of the barrel.

The wheels were prepared with undercoat, topcoat, and chipping as well. To paint the solid rubber tires, I used the bottom of Dixie cup to mask off the wheel center so I could airbrush flat black on the tire without any overspray on the wheel. The two tire sides were painted separately and cemented in place when dried.





The kit provides armor piercing and HE shells as well as wood crates and metal containers.





I have been experimenting with Paper Mache to create tentage, tarps, and other fabric stowage items. For this PaK40, I used a paper hand towel to make a folded blanket for the gunner to sit on. The gunner often sits on the left trailing arm to aim and fire the gun. It was common to see a shelter quarter or blanket used as a seat cushion.

I used an X-Acto knife handle to mold the wood glue impregnated paper. After several coats of water/glue, the object becomes very hard and ready to be painted. This actually works!!!

magine my chagrin while building my halftrack, I discovered that I had accidentally thrown the windshield away! Now a vehicle that demands a windshield that doesn't have one looks pretty silly! And there are not a lot of viable options to explain away a missing windshield.

My immediately reaction was go on the Internet and do a Google Search for a quick fix. No luck! My next idea was to use a clear document report cover. It would work, but the plastic was rather thin.

By chance I recently purchased a small cutting mat.


Like many products, the packaging included a cardboard back and a molded plastic covering. A light bulb went off: here was the solution to my missing windshield. The hard plastic shell would be an excellent replacement for the lost styrene tossed in the garbage.





My hack began with the creation of a template with paper. As Ross Perot said, I measured twice (at least) and cut once. Once satisfied with the paper template, I attached it to the plastic shell with tape. Using the template as a guide, I carefully cut the plastic with an X-Acto (hobby) knife.

The result is probably better than the original. Being a bit thinner than styrene, the replacement windshield fits better with no bulging out of the frame. It may be more difficult to represent bullet holes and cracks, but I haven't tried that yet.






