
ledge: no... it can't be... anything but that... please, don't do it to me... not a GUNDAM!

On November 5th of...

1915: Born in Webster Groves, MO, first Lieutenant George H. Cannon was the first U.S. Marine in WWII to receive the Medal of Honor. He died from his wound in December 1941 during the Japanese bombardment of the Midway Island.

Also born on the same day in Stillwater, OK was Lieutenant General Julian Ewell, US Army commander of the 9th Infantry Division and II Field Force during the Vietnam War. Recipient of the Legion of Merit, Air Medal, Silver Star, Distinguished

Service Cross and Distinguished Service Medal, he died in 2009 at the age of 93.

1940: Franklin D. Roosevelt won an unprecedented third term as President of the United States, carrying 38 of the 48 states.

1945: Peter Pace, future 16th Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff (2005-2007), was born in New York City.

1950: The Battle of Pakchon between the Australian and the Chinese forces during the Korea War began as the 3rd Battalion of the Royal Australian Regiment (3 RAR) captured a well-defended hill with limited offensive support. The diggers held it in the face of heavy counterattacks before making a disorganized night withdrawal.

Shortly before midnight, the Chinese offensive abruptly halted across the Korea Peninsular. The temporarily withdrawal of PLA forces was later described "as incomprehensible as it was welcomed" by an South Korean observer.

try and convey a little about what the "big deal" is about Gundam and suggest some other sci-fi subjects as an encouragement to give one a go!

Gundam: Giant Robots in Space

Gundam began in 1979 with the Japanese animated TV series "Mobile Suit Gundam." It featured giant robots, and while the TV show debuted to mix success, a year later it was followed by what would be a hugely successful model kit line, with the genre often referred to as "Gunpla" from Gundam Plastic Model. Fast-forward to 2025, Bandai Namco reports Gundam-related annual revenues of 153.5 billion yen—that's over \$1 billion dollars—and a significant proportion is from model kit sales!

Modern Gundam kits are usually easy to build thanks to Bandai's great engineering. They come in colored plastic which allows for a presentable replica when unpainted, but the top builders will always paint their kits. The kits come in several different designations, called "grades," which can appear complicated at first, but in summary, they are:

- High Grade (HG): 1:144th scale, affordable, many choices of subjects
- Master Grade (MG): 1:100th scale, much more detail, a range of prices
- Real Grade (RG): 1:144th scale, more detailed like MG above, but scaled down
- Perfect Grade (PG): 1:60th scale behemoths, with all the detail, articulation, and LEDs you could shake a stick

If you're interested in practicing a different set of skills from "regular" armor modeling, then Gundam might be a good choice for you. Achieving the flawless and colorful paint jobs is more akin to automotive modeling, and the top Gunpla competitors are also skilled in adding additional scratchbuild details and rescribing panel lines to make them more intricate. Because the kits offer great articulation, deciding on a dynamic pose is also an important part of the presentation.

If a TV-inspired build sounds good but Gundam doesn't sound like exactly your cup of tea, then there are a wealth of other media-inspired model kit lines to choose from (e.g. Star Wars, Transformers, Gerry Anderson's Thunderbirds).

Maschinen Krieger: Robotic Subjects with Armor Painting and Weathering

If you'd like to build a sci-fi subject but want something a bit closer to home where the painting and weathering is concerned, then Maschinen Krieger (Ma.K) could be a good option for you. Created by Japanese artist Kow Yokoyama in the 1980s, the series has a grittier and more realistic aesthetic. It features armored fighting suits as well as larger vehicles, and many of the color schemes are WWII-inspired.

Over the years Ma.K model kits have been produced by a number of companies, including Nitto and Wave Corporation, with some of the early kits becoming highly sought-after collectors' items. In recent times, Hasegawa also obtained the license to produce kits, which has resulted in a big increase in both availability and popularity.

Most Ma.K kits are in $1/20^{\text{th}}$ scale, but there is also a new $1/35^{\text{th}}$ line which means all of your figures and stowage items are fair game!

What-Ifs: Something Closer to Home

If galactic warfare doesn't float your boat, you could consider some of the "what-if" options available, depicting subjects could have existed if history had played out slightly differently. Options in this category include ModelCollect's "Fist of War" series, the line of apocalypse tanks from the Red Alert video game produced by Border Models, and a plethora of "paper panzers," including the gargantuan Landkreuzer P.1000 "Ratte" which has been kitted by Takom among others.






